# **Bonner Community Leaders Program**

Since its launch at Simmons in 2022, the Bonner Program has provided a transformative, four-year experience centered on service, leadership, and community partnership. This nationally recognized program empowers students to make a tangible difference through their work with local organizations, all while building and refining their leadership abilities.

A key component of the Bonner Program is its commitment to equity: it offers four years of financial aid support to its Leaders. This assistance helps break down financial barriers for low-income and often historically underrepresented students, including students of color and first-generation students, enabling them to fully commit to and benefit from their community engagement.



### 2024 - 2025 Highlights

- 22 Bonner Community Leaders served up to 10 hours per week for the course of the academic year
- Bonner Leaders worked alongside 16 Community Partners
- Together, Bonners served a total of 5,498 hours over the course of the year



Simmons University is the first institution of higher education in Massachusetts and only the third in New England to be accepted into the Bonner network.


The Bonner Program model has proven to be a successful model for the enrollment, retention, and graduation of low-income, first generation, and diverse students.

Students in the Bonner Program identify as: African American (23%); Latina (14%); Asian (9%); White (49%); and two or more (5%) Of the 22 Bonner leaders, **55%** are the first in their families to go to college.

## **Jumpstart AmeriCorps**

During the academic year, students serve 300 hours by providing language, literacy, and social-emotional programming for preschool children from underserved communities. In addition to the 60+ hours of early childhood and social justice training, students work in teams to intentionally plan their classroom engagement to help the young children in Boston enter kindergarten prepared to succeed. ### **Funding & Awards**

- \$28,171.44 awarded to students in the Segal Education Award scholarship
- \$102,105 sub-granted to Simmons to staff and operate Jumpstart on campus
- \$45,000 secured in stipends from Jumpstart for non-federal work study students

# Strong Women, Strong Girls

Thirty four Simmons students served as Strong Women, Strong Girls mentors working in 4 local elementary schools for a collective 2,470 service hours.

Through SWSG, mentors utilize a research-based curriculum that incorporates the study of contemporary and historic female role models, skill-building activities, and strong relationships with mentors and peers to work with 3rd through 5th grade girls and nonbinary youth.

The program has helped me think more deeply about the kind of impact I want to have in my future career. It showed me how powerful mentorship and community involvement can be, and it made me realize that I want my long-term goals to include supporting and empowering others—especially young people.

# America Learns

America Learns is an in-school volunteer program that provides fundamental support to teachers and educators at the Orchard Gardens K-8 Pilot School in Roxbury.

This year, **fifteen** Simmons Students volunteered in, eighth-grade ESL, kindergarten, second grade, ABA Music, and the school library!

In Portland, the students had the unique opportunity to engage directly with local community organizations, deepening their insights into systemic issues like affordable housing, the school-to-prison pipeline, and the multifaceted policies required to build a more inclusive and sustainable future.

Over the course of an enriching week, our students participated in a variety of immersive activities and service projects that not only enhanced their academic learning but also spurred profound personal growth. These experiences included volunteering with the Transitions Project, Blanchet House, and Portland's Books through Bars. Students also visited the Oregon Historical Society, the Q Center, and Portland Playhouse to immerse themselves in Portland's history and culture



# Alternative Spring Break

Alternative Spring Break ("ASB") is a reflectionbased, student-led program where teams engage in a social justice curriculum that prepares them to learn and serve in another community during a oneweek trip over spring break.

This year's Alternative Spring Break took a diverse group of nine students—ranging from sophomores to seniors and representing a wide array of majors such as nursing, public policy, data analytics, and beyond—to Portland, Oregon. Their journey was designed to immerse them in the historical and contemporary contexts of pressing social challenges.



When reflecting on the experience, one student said, "This program has greatly improved my confidence as both a leader and a member of a team. ASB was an incredible experience- I learned so much not only about my peers and the issues at hand, but also about myself. I feel confident in my abilities to navigate a new area with a group, make decisions, and do so with great teamwork."

"My experience in ASB has been incredible. It is such a meaningful opportunity for students to engage with communities, learn through service, and reflect deeply on social issues. I especially valued the connections I made — by far, my favorite part of the program was the people, both within our group and in the Portland community!"

# Community-Engaged Learning Courses

The London Center supports community-engaged learning (CEL) courses across the curriculum at Simmons. In CEL courses, students learn through mutually beneficial partnerships with external communities, both in greater Boston and beyond.

# Course Spotlight PSYC328: Health Disparities in the US

Students in this advanced special topics class were able to gain a firsthand understanding of health disparities and how healthcare professionals can address these disparities through volunteering at Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program's Health, Empowerment, and Resources (HER) for women every Saturday. The class also conducted a drive for much-needed supplies for women who access the clinic.

### **Continuity within Chaos**

# International Women's Day






Simmons has the privilege of working with organizations from across the Greater Boston area that work to advance gender equity to put on this breakfast. This year we hosted about 250 area leaders for the 27th Annual Boston International Women's Day Breakfast with a theme of "Action in Unity." After welcomes from both President Wooten and Mayor Wu, an engaging panel moderated by Collette Phillips discussed how women can collectively rise to the moment.

## Reading Douglass Together

With generous funding from the Mass Humanities Council, Simmons joined organizations across the Commonwealth to host a collective reading of Frederick Douglass' speech, "What to the Slave Is the Fourth of July?" The hybrid event welcomed faculty, staff, students, and alumni to participate in the reading. The event featured former Massachusetts State Rep Byron Rushing (HON '11) to discuss the relevance of the speech today.



## Volunteer Engagement

Service, volunteering, and philanthropy are activities which help participants in the Simmons community learn about and understand social injustices and ongoing efforts to make real and lasting social change. This year, the London Center provided several opportunities to invite the Simmons community to engage and support our local communities as well as learn in and with those communities.



### **Muddy River Clean Up**

In collaboration with Sunrise Simmons and the Muddy Water Initiative, we supported a fall and spring clean up of the Muddy River, helping to contribute to environmental sustainabiltiy just outside our campus doors.

### Rosie's Place

20 students volunteered at to serve meals at Rosie's Place, a women's shelter, during Women's Centered College Week. The Student Athletic Advisory Committee conducted a drive to create self-care kits for the women Rosie's Place serves.



### **Freedom Rally**

Simmons partnered with Embrace Boston to commemorate Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s 1965 March and Rally in Boston. Our Bonner staff and student leaders volunteered together to help make this event a success
