



# **Simmons University Campus Climate Report**

### Introduction

The Massachusetts Department of Higher Education (DHE) requires institutions of higher education to conduct a survey at least every four years, addressing sexual misconduct, harassment, and violence on college campuses. To achieve this goal, the Massachusetts DHE created a Task Force that developed and issued a series of survey questions, which were approved by the DHE Commissioner. This report presents the results of the state-mandated survey.

The principal investigators received approval to conduct this study from the Institutional Review Board at Simmons University in September 2024 (IRB-25-194). The data collection method for this study consisted of an anonymous online survey administered to students at Simmons University. The participant population for this study consisted of students enrolled at Simmons University at the time of survey administration. This included undergraduate and graduate students across various disciplines and academic levels. Informed consent explained to the students that the questions would ask about their experiences, knowledge, and perceptions related to sexual misconduct, harassment, and violence. It also clarified that the survey was completely anonymous, participation was voluntary, and there was no penalty if students decided to skip any questions or choose not to participate at all.

The principal investigators identified 4,606 students eligible for participation. Starting in October 2024, these students were invited to participate in the survey, administered in Qualtrics. Students received several reminders to increase participation. In November 2024, a reminder also appeared on the University's Moodle Dashboard. This effort yielded a total of 506 responses, 11% of the student population initially contacted. Responses may be partial, as all survey questions were optional and students were able to determine the extent of their participation in the survey. Moreover, the visibility of some sections of the survey was contingent on students' selected responses. For these reasons, the number of respondents for each question is variable and often lower than the total number of participants.

The following pages highlight selected key findings from the survey. Detailed tables for all survey questions are available in the appendix.

## **Perceptions of Campus Climate Regarding Sexual Misconduct**

- Most respondents believe it is likely that Simmons will respond appropriately if a student reports an incident of sexual misconduct. For example:
  - o 78% believe Simmons will likely maintain the privacy of the person making the report.
  - o 66% believe Simmons will likely take the report seriously.
  - 63% believe Simmons will likely support the reporting party.
- In many cases, the majority of respondents have knowledge of available resources.
  - o 70% know they can initiate a formal complaint.
  - 61% understand they can speak about an incident in confidence.
  - 55% know where to get information, support, and help on campus.
- Before coming to Simmons, 88% of respondents received some form of information or education on sexual misconduct.

- After joining Simmons, the most common sources of information about sexual misconduct are discussions with friends, posters, crime alerts, student publications and media outlets, and discussion with family members.
- Information from Simmons focused predominantly on the student code of conduct and Title IX protections against sexual misconduct.
- The majority of students are "extremely" or "somewhat aware" of several Simmons resources related to sexual misconduct response, particularly the Counseling Center (91.5%) and the Health Center (88.3%).

### **Sexual Harassment by Faculty and Staff**

- Sixteen survey items measured various aspects of sexual harassment by faculty or staff members.
- In most cases, at least 98% of respondents reported never experiencing the types of sexual harassment indicated, including:
  - Gestures or body language of a sexual nature.
  - o Unwanted attempts to establish a romantic sexual relationship.
  - o Repeated invitations for dates, drinks, dinner, etc., even after being told "no".
  - Being touched in a way that made them feel uncomfortable.
  - Unwanted attempts to stroke, fondle, or kiss them.
  - o Bribing with rewards in exchange for engaging in sexual behavior.
  - Threats with some sort of retaliation.
  - Treating a student badly for refusing to have sex.
  - o Implying that sexual cooperation would lead to better treatment.

## **Sexual Harassment by Students**

- Twelve survey items inquired about sexual harassment by other students.
- The two items with the highest rate of reporting (20%) are:
  - o Repeatedly telling sexual stories or jokes that were offensive to the respondent.
  - Making unwelcome attempts to draw the respondent into a discussion of sexual matters.

Most respondents reported that these types of incidents happened either "once or twice" or "sometimes."

- A very low occurrence rate was reported for several items. For example:
  - 95% of respondents reported "never" experiencing repeated invitations for dates, drinks, dinner, etc., after saying "no."
  - 92% of respondents reported "never" experiencing sexual rumors being spread by electronic means or being targeted with homophobic or transphobic content by electronic means.
- In most of the reported cases of sexual harassment by a student, the specific behavior described involved sexist or sexually offensive language, gestures or pictures, and unwanted sexual attention.
- The most common reactions were to ignore and avoid the individual engaging in the behavior and to treat the incident as a joke.

### **Stalking Victimization**

- Ten survey items assessed whether respondents had experienced stalking behaviors since enrolling at Simmons.
- The vast majority of respondents reported such incidents had never happened. For example,
   94% of respondents reported no experience with being watched or followed from a distance, or being spied on with a device.
- The most reported incidents involved online activities.
  - o 11% of respondents (n=25) reported that someone made rude or mean comments online, with 6% indicating that this occurred only once or twice.
  - 12% of respondents (n=26) reported that someone spread rumors about them online, with 7% indicating it occurred only once or twice.

### **Dating Violence Victimization**

- Six survey items measured dating violence, specifically perpetrated by a hook-up, partner, or spouse since respondents enrolled at Simmons.
- 11% of respondents who reported dating violence indicated that the individual engaging in the behavior can scare them without laying a hand on them, with 5% reporting this occurred once or twice.
- Most commonly, the subject was a former romantic partner (40%) and not a Simmons student (71%).

### Other Gender-Based or Sexual Orientation-Based Violence

- Respondents were asked whether, since being enrolled at Simmons, they have experienced any non-sexual violence that they felt was based on their gender, gender identity, gender expression or sexual orientation.
- 92% of respondents reported "never" having experienced this.

### **Sexual Violence Victimization**

- Five sets of survey questions asked about incidents of sexual violence.
- Respondents were instructed to select the number of times each incident happened to them. If several incidents occurred on the same occasion, respondents were instructed to address each incident individually.
- Across these 30 questions, the share of respondents selecting "0 times" varied from 94% to 99.5%.
- Two additional sets of questions asked about sexual violence specifically in the absence of
  "active, ongoing voluntary consent". The first of these additional sets of questions addressed
  contact involving penetrative or oral sex, with 94.4% of respondents indicating this type of
  contact never happened. The second set of additional questions addressed kissing or sexual
  touching with 93% of respondents reporting this never happened.

### **Institutional Responses**

 The next module followed up on respondents that reported at least one incident on any of the following questions:

- o The 16 items measuring Sexual Harassment by Faculty and Staff.
- The 12 items inquiring about Sexual Harassment by Students.
- The 10 items asking about Stalking Victimization.
- The 6 items measuring Dating Violence Victimization.
- The 30 items pertaining to Sexual Violence Victimization.
- This yielded a subsample of 138 students. As with the rest of the survey, all of the questions were optional, thus the number of students who answered any question may be less than 138.
- 44.4% of respondents (n=24) told someone about the incident (including official reports).
- Predominantly, these respondents told a close friend (29%), a parent, step-parent, or guardian (15%) or an intimate partner (12%). 9% told the Title IX Office/Title IX Coordinator or Deputy Coordinator.
- 54% of respondents were told where they could obtain local, state, or campus medical services, and 41% were told where they could obtain local, state, or campus legal services and/or information about possible civil and criminal justice remedies.
- 43% received information about resources for protection from retaliation and 57% about access to other school-based supportive measures.
- The main reason why respondents chose not to contact any of the available programs or services is that they did not think it was serious enough (19%, n=10) and/or they felt embarrassed, ashamed, or that it would be too emotionally difficult (15%, n=8).

### **Bystander Intervention**

- Eight items asked respondents about their intervention when a given situation arose at Simmons.
- In addition to skipping this question (which was optional, as with the rest of the survey), a "Not applicable" option was available.
- The most common intervention reported was speaking up against sexist jokes (60% intervened), walking a friend home from a party, bar, or other social event because they were very intoxicated or high (59% intervened), and asking someone who looked very upset at a party if they are okay or needed help (57% intervened). 49% of respondents talked to the friends of a drunk or high person to make sure they did not leave them behind at a party, bar, or other social event.
